Judge Matt Beasley was born in Slidell, Louisiana and moved to The Woodlands in 1996 where he graduated from The Woodlands High School class of 2002. After graduating from the University of Houston-Downtown police academy, he was hired by Constable Tim Holifield as a Woodlands Patrol Deputy and later transferred to the Sheriff's Office where he worked for Sheriff Tommy Gage as a Detective before leaving to work for Commissioner James Noack as a project manager and later as Chief of Staff.

Judge Beasley has served the community in many different capacities, Grogan's Mill Village Association Former Vice President, member of The Woodlands First Baptist Church and past master of Oak Wood Masonic Lodge #1444 and was appointed to serve the Grand Lodge of Texas as the District Education Officer. He also served as the secretary to the City of Oak Ridge North Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone board of directors. Judge Beasley graduated with a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice Administration from Tarleton State University and is also a Certified Public Manager with the State of Texas through course work from the William P. Hobby center for public service at Texas State University.

Since Judge Beasley's election in November 2018, he and his professional court staff have implemented new dockets to provide better access to the court including: criminal night court; civil night court, and teen court. Providing more convenient times for the public to handle their cases has been a hallmark achievement for Judge Beasley and the court staff. It is the mission of the Justice of the Peace Court to serve the people of Montgomery County with professional and efficient administration of justice with integrity, fairness and respect.

Constable Gable started his law enforcement career with the Harris County Constable's Office Precinct 4 in 1993. During his career with that office, he worked all aspects of law enforcement and was promoted to the rank of Captain. He retired from the Harris County Constable's Office Precinct 4 in August of 2012. Constable Gable was elected to Constable of the Montgomery County Constable's Office Precinct 3 and went to work in his new position August 1, 2012. He is a TCOLE instructor, and has taught for numerous years with the Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas with Sam Houston State, Sam Houston's Bill Blackwood school of law and the Texas Justice Court Training Center with Texas State University. Constable Gable is a state expert in the management and service of Civil and Writ Process. He is married to his high school sweetheart and has two great children.




Membership:

On August 9, 2023, our own Senator Brandon Creighton welcomed Governor Greg Abbott to Montgomery County to sign bills providing historic tax relief for Texas taxpayers!

"New Caney, Texas- BREAKING: GOVERNOR ABBOTT CHOOSES SD 4 TO SIGN THE LARGEST PROPERTY TAX CUT IN HISTORY.

Today, Governor Abbott traveled to SD 4 to sign SB 2, SB 3 and HJR2 into law and highlight the incredible businesses and industry in Montgomery County. This \$18 billion package includes:

\$100,000 homestead exemption (400% increase since 2021)

\$12 Billion to reduce the school property tax rate

200% increase of the current franchise tax exemption for Texas small businesses

Increased transparency and accountability for homeowners when protesting their appraisal.

Americanism Report: The Forgotten War of 1812

Background: In the last major battle of America's War of Independence, Gen. Lord Cornwallis' British regulars surrendered to Gen. George Washington's continental army and their French allies (Yorktown, VA, October 19, 1781). Two years later, both sides signed the Treaty of Paris (1783), officially ending eight years of bloody conflict that started with the Shot Heard Round the World (Battle of Lexington & Concord, MA, 1775).

Americans were weary of war and the nascent government was heavily in debt. They hoped for a lasting peace, but it was not to be. Britain operated freely in North America. It refused to relinquish forts in the the northern and western border areas. Angry Americans continued to confiscate property from U.S. citizens who had remained loyal to the the Crown during the war.

The War of 1812: The main reason for the War of 1812 was much more global. The deep-seated animosity between England and France escalated after the French Revolution. Napoleon and fellow revolutionaries were exporting their ideas and their power across Europe. England was threatened. The Napoleonic Wars (1799-1815) soon spilled onto the Atlantic Ocean. Both the French and the English took steps to control trade which negatively affected the US economy.

Equally loathsome, British warships seized over 400 U.S. merchant ships and their cargoes. They "impressed" up to 10,000 American seamen into British naval service, often spuriously calling the men British deserters.

To stop the piracy of American vessels and the enslavement of American sailors, President James Madison declared war on Britain in 1812. By 1814, the war ended in a draw, U.S. borders returned to antebellum status quo, and the British rescinded their blockade and capture of American sailors.

Results of the War of 1812: Historians' opinions of the War of 1812 continue to evolve. Some view it as insignificant, some as negative, and some as beneficial.

On the positive side, the USS Constitution Museum (<u>USSConstitutionMuseum.org</u>) cites the U.S. won

important battles, such as the bombardment of Fort McHenry, MD, where Francis Scott Key penned "The Star Spangled Banner." (This 19th century version (MP3) version of the Star-Spangled Banner was performed on original instruments from the National Museum of American History's collection, as it would have been heard in 1854.) At the Battle of New Orleans, Major General Andrew Jackson won the battle against the British, won glory for himself, and became the 7th President of the United States. Approximately 125 years later, a country-western singer named Johnny Horton reacquainted the American public with this famous battle and won a Grammy for Song of the Year: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=aXfuQqkwa51

New American heroes emerged during the War of 1812. These included U.S. Naval Commander Oliver H. Perry, whose blue and white pennant in the Battle of Lake Erie stated, "Don't Give Up the Ship." In Perry's victory message to General William Henry Harrison, he extolled, "We have met the enemy and they are ours."

The War of 1812 brought Dolley Madison lasting fame. This First Lady is remembered for her heroism, saving Executive Mansion papers and preserving the life-sized painting of Gen. George Washington from dishonor and destruction by British soldiers. The invading troops torched the presidential home, the U.S. Capitol, the Library of Congress and other Federal buildings but in so doing, emblazoned Mrs. Madison's reputation into the pages of history.

According to WhiteHouseHistory.org, "Dolley Madison... was home-grown, home-schooled, and down-to-earth..." and she set the standard for the role of the President's spouse.

The War of 1812 established new American symbols: the fighting frigate USS Constitution (Old Ironsides), the enormous Fort McHenry flag (30' x 42') and Uncle Sam, a Troy, NY businessman named Samuel Wilson who supplied barrels of meat to the US Army stamped "U.S." When asked what the initials stood for, one of Wilson's workers said it stood for Uncle Sam Wilson.

The War of 1812 was not a "Great War," a "Civil War," or a "War to End All Wars," but it was a profound event in American history and should never be forgotten.

Literacy Committee Report

The Woodlands Republican Women has always given our luncheon guest speaker a gift as a token of our appreciation. Last year, the Literacy Committee proposed we make a more meaningful and lasting tribute to each speaker by donating a book in their honor to a local library. One of our goals as a club is to provide a variety of ways to educate and inform our community about persons, events, and accomplishments that helped to make our country the greatest nation in all history. To forward this effort, the committee suggested to our board we choose children's books that relay stories inspiring patriotism, pride, and love of our country as the standard for guest speaker gifts. Some of the books talk of historical figures who helped shape our country, like President George Washington. Others highlight buildings, monuments, or symbols that represent important reminders of strength and unity, such as the White House, the Lincoln Memorial or the American flag. Still others incline the reader to appreciate the courage and sacrifices made by many to secure and keep our nation's freedom for all, such as the words of our national anthem which were penned by Francis Scott Key as he watched the battle of Fort McHenry from the bow of a British warship during the American Revolution.

Each book has an inscription stating the book was donated by The Woodlands Republican Women in honor of a guest speaker. Included is the speaker's name, title or position, and the date they spoke. The speaker is also invited to inscribe their own message and sign the book.

The criteria for books chosen are:

- 1. The story must be factually accurate.
- 2. They must be well written with correct grammar and punctuation.
- 3. All books are hardback so they will withstand years of use.
- 4. The books are large and colorful so children will be attracted to them.
- 5. The illustrations must be tasteful and appropriate to children.
- 6. The books should be suited to beginner or intermediate level readers.
